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The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Year B) – 6th June 2021

1st Reading – Exodus 24:3-8
Psalm – The cup of salvation I will raise; I will call on the Lord's name.

2nd Reading – Hebrews 9:11-15
Gospel – Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Today's solemnity focuses our hearts and minds on the mystery of the Lord's abiding presence in our midst in the sacrament of the Eucharist. When we talk about the Body and Blood of Christ we are referring to Jesus. He gives Himself to us as food under the appearance of bread and wine. What does it mean to receive Him?

Moses in the book of Exodus draws a link between the altar, the blood, and the teaching. To receive the Lord who is present on the altar, to be cleansed by His blood when we receive Him entails our commitment together with the Israelites to observe the Lord's commands and put them into practice. God is fulfilling His commitment to that Covenant by forgiving us our sins and setting us free from the slavery of sin whenever we come to Him with a contrite heart and confess. He gives us strength to respond to this gift and learn to live in obedience to His will. To receive Holy Communion means our need to remain faithful to the teaching of the Church, the teaching of Christ who is the Head of His Church. We cannot separate the Body and Blood of Christ from the Church who gives us that precious gift.

God comes to us in order to make us more faithful. He doesn't come as a reward for our good behaviour, but as the Gospels remind us He comes to the sick and the sinner in order to heal. The letter to the Hebrews describes the Lord as our mediator who brings His own blood into the presence of God to intercede for us, who is there in the presence of the Father showing His wounds in order to obtain mercy for us. The same mercy draws Him to come down from heaven to the altar at every celebration of the Eucharist, to come into sinful hearts in order to cleanse us, enlighten us, and unite us more closely with Himself.

St. Francis of Assisi had a great devotion to the Eucharist as he saw the poverty and humility of God who leaves the glory of heaven behind in order to dwell with us and be united with us so intimately. As we reflect on the immensity of God's love for us, let us in our turn give ourselves wholly to Him in return.

1st **Holy Communion** – This Sunday we congratulate Christabela Fernandes Soares and Jecarinha Tilman Freitas who receive their **1**st Holy Communion. We pray for them on this joyful occasion that they may grow in their love for God.

Baptism – This Saturday 5th June we welcome into the Church Roselyn Desia Soares Rangel who will be baptized. Congratulations to her and her family.

Important information for EU Citizens

If you are an EU passport holder and have not yet obtained Settled status please be aware that the deadline for this is the end of June this year. It applies regardless of how long you have been resident in the UK. Spread the word! You can ask for help with your application at **Europa Welcome**, based in East Oxford. They can help with language problems and have information on their website in **Tetum**, the language of East Timor, many of whose citizens hold Portuguese passports.
